# Veteran's Spotlight Vern Draxler

This Veteran's Spotlight shines on the "Spud Man," Vern Draxler, who cleans every single potato served during the Post's Fish Frys. This past event found 2760 potatoes passing through his hands & paring knife.

In 1937, Vern was born in Auburndale, Wisconsin where he lived with his parents and 5 sisters and 3 brothers.

He attended grade school in Auburndale and high school in Marshfield Wisconsin, graduating in 1955. He earned a degree in Industrial Education from Stout State College in 1959 with plans to teach.

However, knowing he was scheduled to be drafted in a couple of months, he enlisted in the Army for 3 years. After his training, he spent 2 years at the NORAD (North American Defense Command). He was part of a combat operations team in charge of early warnings of missile sites in Canada and Greenland. On October 5, 1960, at 1:00 am he was called into the Combat Operations Center. Radar system signals from Greenland indicated Russian missiles were headed for the United States. The NORAD Commanding Officer, General Kuter was on the red phone with President Kennedy all night. Ultimately, it was determined it was a false alarm caused by the moonrise over Norway, which caused radar reflections that were misinterpreted by the system as a missile launch. Soviet leader Khrushchev was in New York at the time of the supposed attack further adding to doubts that it was a real attack. In the third year of his service, the Army offered a program where if you extended your service an additional 4 years, they would pay for 2 years of education. Vern accepted the offer and attended the University of Wisconsin at Madison, graduating in 1963 with a degree in Physics. He was assigned to the Frankford Arsenal in Philadelphia. During WWII, this arsenal manufactured weaponry and then went into research. He was assigned to the research lab working with high velocity

experimental ammunition made with tungsten alloy and steel reaching velocities of 7200 feet per second. Most of the research was in terminal ballistics, meaning that it is the study of projectile-target interaction. To obtain data on these events, high speed instrumentation,



primarily high-speed cameras and flash x-ray were used

In 1967 when he was discharged, he moved to Minnesota and was employed at Honeywell Defense Division doing the same type of work. In 1990 Honywell split off to Alliant Tech Systems from which Vern retired in 1998. Professionally, he is a member of the Aeroballistic Range Association. While attending school in Madison Wi., he met Rita who was a nurse serving in the U.S Army Reserves as a 1<sup>st</sup> Lieutenant in a field hospital unit. They married in 1963 and moved to Philadelphia when Vern was assigned to Frankford Arsenal. They raised 3 daughters, have 9 grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren. Rita passed away in 2023. Vern joined the Elk River American Legion in 1968. He worked his way up the chain serving as 2<sup>nd</sup> and 1<sup>st</sup> Vice Commander, Adjutant and served as Commander in 1973-74. He along with Jerry Takle and Ray Doebler are the remaining charter members of the American Legion Honor Guard and have served in that capacity since about 1984. He was band leader of the Elk River German Band for 34 years and has now turned that responsibilty over to his son-in-law. He enjoys fishing and woodworking.

For the past 8 years he has been a member of the Honeywell Retirees Volunteer Program, a group of Honeywell retirees who partner with Rebuilding Together Minnesota. They build access ramps for people with disabilities. The group donates their time, and various companies pay for the materials. The group averages one to two projects per month. The soft-spoken Vern has served Post 112 over the years and still steps up when called upon. He has earned the respect of his peers and is highly regarded.
